



# 1.5 Rear panel features

The rear panel includes the expansion slots, system power socket, and rear fans. The middle part includes the I/O shield with openings for the rear panel connectors on the motherboard.





- The ports for the PS/2 keyboard, PS/2 mouse, USB, VGA, and Gigabit LAN do not appear on the rear panel if motherboard is not present.
- \*The port is for ASUS ASMB4-iKVM controller card only.


The barebone server does not include a floppy disk drive. Connect a USB floppy disk drive to any of the USB ports on the front or rear panel if you need to use a floppy disk.





# 2.1 Chassis cover

# Removing the rear cover

 Loosen the two thumbscrews on the rear panel to release the rear cover from the chassis.





3. Lift the cover from the chassis.

# 2.2 Central Processing Unit (CPU)

The motherboard comes with two surface mount LGA1366 sockets designed for the Intel® Xeon® Dual/Quad Core processor.




- Your boxed Intel® Xeon® LGA1366 processor package should come with installation instructions for the CPU and heatsink. If the instructions in this section do not match the CPU documentation, follow the latter.
- Upon purchase of the motherboard, ensure that the PnP cap is on the socket and the socket contacts are not bent. Contact your retailer immediately if the PnP cap is missing, or if you see any damage to the PnP cap/socket contacts/motherboard components. ASUS will shoulder the cost of repair only if the damage is shipment/transit-related.
- Keep the cap after installing the motherboard. ASUS will process Return Merchandise Authorization (RMA) requests only if the motherboard comes with the cap on the LGA1366 socket.
- The product warranty does not cover damage to the socket contacts resulting from incorrect CPU installation/removal, or misplacement/loss/ incorrect removal of the PnP cap.

#### 2.2.1 Installing the CPU

To install a CPU:

1. Locate the CPU socket on the motherboard.



Z8NR-D12-SYS CPU LGA1366 Socket




Before installing the CPU, ensure that the socket box is facing towards you and the load lever is on your left.

Press the load lever with your thumb


 (A), then move it to the left (B) until
 it is released from the retention tab.




To prevent damage to the socket pins, do not remove the PnP cap unless you are installing a CPU.



- 3. Lift the load lever in the direction of the arrow to a 135° angle.
- 4. Lift the load plate with your thumb and forefinger to a 100° angle.




5. Remove the PnP cap from the CPU socket.



 Position the CPU over the socket, ensuring that the gold triangle is on the bottom-left corner of the socket, and then fit the socket alignment key into the CPU notch.



The CPU fits in only one correct orientation. DO NOT force the CPU into the socket to prevent bending the connectors on the socket and damaging the CPU!




Apply some Thermal Interface
 Material to the exposed area of
 the CPU that the heatsink will be
 in contact with, ensuring that it is
 spread in an even thin layer.



Some heatsinks come with preapplied thermal paste. If so, skip this step.




DO NOT eat the thermal Interface Material. If it gets into your eyes or touches your skin, ensure that you wash it off immediately and seek professional medical help.





To prevent contaminating the paste, DO NOT spread the paste with your finger directly.

8. Close the load plate (A), and then push the load lever (B) until it snaps into the retention tab.



# 2.2.2 Installing the CPU heatsink and airduct

To install the CPU heatsink:

 Place the heatsink on top of the installed CPU, ensuring that the four fasteners match the holes on the motherboard.



 Twist each of the four screws with a Philips (cross) screwdriver just enough to attach the heatsink to the motherboard. When the four screws are attached, tighten them one by one to completely secure the heatsink







Tighten the four heatsink screws in a diagonal sequence.

#### To install the airduct:

Position the airduct on top of the heatsink.



2. Carefully lower the airduct until it fits in place.




# 2.3 System memory

#### 2.3.1 Overview

The motherboard comes with twelve (12) Double Data Rate 3 (DDR3) Dual Inline Memory Modules (DIMM) sockets.

The figure illustrates the location of the DDR3 DIMM sockets:

Due to Intel CPU spec definition, the system will not boot if only one DIMM is installed in DIMM slot A2, B2, or C2 for CPU1, or D2, E2 or F2 for CPU2. Follow the table above for recommended memory configuration.

# 2.3.2 Memory configurations

You may install 512 MB, 1 GB, 2 GB, 4 GB and 8GB registered DIMMs or Unbuffered DIMM with ECC / non- ECC into the DIMM sockets.




- Always install DIMMs with the same CAS latency. For optimum compatibility, we recommend that you obtain memory modules from the same vendor. Refer to the Qualified Vendors List on the ASUS web site.
- You may install varying memory sizes in Channel A, Channel B and Channel C. The system maps the total size of the lower-sized channel for the dual-channel or triple-channel configuration. Any excess memory from the higher-sized channel is then mapped for single-channel operation.
- Due to the memory address limitation on 32-bit Windows OS, when you install 4GB or more memory on the motherboard, the actual usable memory for the OS can be about 3GB or less. For effective use of memory, we recommend that you install a 64-bit Windows OS when having 4GB or more memory installed on the motherboard.
- This motherboard does not support memory modules made up of 256 Mb chips.

# 2.3.3 Installing a DIMM



Ensure to unplug the power supply before adding or removing DIMMs or other system components. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to both the motherboard and the components.

- 1. Unlock a DIMM socket by pressing the retaining clips outward.
- Align a DIMM on the socket such that the notch on the DIMM matches the break on the socket.




Unlocked retaining clip



A DIMM is keyed with a notch so that it fits in only one direction. DO NOT force a DIMM into a socket to avoid damaging the DIMM.

 Firmly insert the DIMM into the socket until the retaining clips snap back in place and the DIMM is properly seated.




**Locked Retaining Clip** 

# 2.3.4 Removing a DIMM

Follow these steps to remove a DIMM.

 Simultaneously press the retaining clips outward to unlock the DIMM.





Support the DIMM lightly with your fingers when pressing the retaining clips. The DIMM might get damaged when it flips out with extra force.


Remove the DIMM from the socket.

# 2.4 Hard disk drives

The system supports four hot-swap SATAII/SAS hard disk drives. The hard disk drive installed on the drive tray connects to the motherboard SATAII/SAS ports via the SATAII/SAS backplane.

To install a hot-swap SATAII/SAS HDD:

 Release a drive tray by pushing the spring lock to the right, then pulling the tray lever outward. The drive tray ejects slightly after you pull out the lever



2. Firmly hold the tray lever and pull the drive tray out of the bay.



 Take note of the drive tray holes. Each side has three holes to fit different types of hard disk drives. Use two screws on each side to secure the hard disk drive.



 Place a SATAII/SAS hard disk drive on the tray, then secure it with four screws.



 Carefully insert the drive tray and push it all the way to the depth of the bay until just a small fraction of the tray edge protrudes.





When installed, the SATAII/SAS connector on the drive connects to the SATAII/SAS interface on the backplane.

- Push the tray lever until it clicks, and secures the drive tray in place. The drive tray is correctly placed when its front edge aligns with the bay edge.
- 7. Repeat steps 1 to 6 if you wish to install a second SATAII/SAS drive.



# 2.5 Expansion slot

# 2.5.1 Installing an expansion card to the riser card bracket

The barebone server comes with a riser card bracket. You need to remove the bracket if you want to install PCI Express x8 or x16 expansion cards.


To install a PCI Express x8 or x16 card:

 Firmly hold the riser card bracket, then pull it up to detach it from the PCI Express x16 slot on the motherboard.



2. Place the riser card bracket on a flat and stable surface, then remove the screw from the slot bay.





 Install a PCI Express x8 or x16 card to the bracket as shown, then secure the card with a screw.






 Repeat the previous steps to Install another PCI Express x8 or x16 card if needed.

#### To reinstall the riser card bracket:

 Align the riser card bracket with the cards to the PCI Express x16 slot on the motherboard.



- Press the riser card bracket until the golden connectors completely fit the slot and the bracket aligns with the rear panel.
- 3. Connect the cable(s) to the card, if applicable.



# 2.5.2 Configuring an expansion card

After installing the expansion card, configure the it by adjusting the software settings.

- 1. Turn on the system and change the necessary BIOS settings, if any. See Chapter 5 for information on BIOS setup.
- 2. Assign an IRQ to the card. Refer to the following tables.
- 3. Install the software drivers for the expansion card.





# 2.8 Removable/optional components

Ensure that the system is turned off before removing any components.


# 2.8.1 System fans

To uninstall the system fans:

 Disconnect the system fan cable from the fan connector on the motherboard.



- 2. Lift the fan, then set aside.
- 3. Repeat steps 1 to 2 to uninstall the other system fans.



#### To reinstall the system fans

- Insert the fan to the fan cage. The airflow directional arrow on the fan side should point towards the system rear panel.
- Connect the system fan cable to the fan connector on the motherboard.









 Set the SGPIO\_SEL1 jumper on the backplane to pin 2-3 when connecting data cables to the SAS connectors on the motherboard.





The heatsink on PIKE 1078 might interfere the components on the expansion card. Ensure that the height of the components is less than 6.7 mm.

### Installing i Button (for PIKE 1078 only)

Follow the steps below to install an optional i Button on your motherboard.

Locate the I Button slot on the motherboard.



2. Snap the I Button in place.



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### 2.8.3 Installing ASMB4 series management board (optional)

Follow the steps below to install an optional ASMB4 series management board on your motherboard.





# Installation options

### 3.1 Rackmount rail kit items (optional)

Your rackmount rail kit package contains:

- · two pair of server rails (for the server)
- two pairs of rack rails (for the rack)
- · Nut-and-bolt type screws



### 3.2 Attaching the rails to the server

To attach the server rails:

 Attach the front end of the server rail to the side of the chassis, matching each of the three hooks to the holes on the rail. Then slide the rail toward the front panel until it locks in place.



Secure the front end of the server rail to the side of the chassis with one screw.



- Attach the rear end of the server rail to the side of the chassis, matching each of the two hooks to the holes on the rail. Then slide the rail toward the front panel until it locks in place.
- Secure the rear end of the server rail to the side of the chassis with one screw.





 Repeat steps 1 to 4 to attach the second server rail to the other side of the chassis

### 3.3 Attaching the rack rails

To attach the rack rails:

- Select one unit of space (1U) on the rack where you want to install the barebone server.
- 2. Install the nuts on the holes of the 1U space on the rack front.
- 3. Install the nuts on the holes of the 1U space on the corresponding rack rear.
- 4. Measure the depth of the rack to determine the length of the rack rails.
- 5. Measure the rack rail when assembled to ensure that it fits the rack.
- Position the rack rail to the 1U space on the rack. Ensure that the front end of the rack rail goes to the front of the rack space.
- 7. Secure the front end of the rail with two rack screws.
- 8. Secure the rear end of the rail with two rack screws.
- Repeat steps 5 to 8 to assemble and attach the second rack rail.



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### 3.4 Rackmounting the server

To mount the server to the rack:

- 1. Align the server rails with the rack rails, then push the server all the way to the depth of the rack.
- 2. Tighten the two rack screws to secure the server in place.



To uninstall the server from the rack:

- 1. Loosen the rack screws that secured the server to the rack.
- 2. Pull the server from the rack.



Remember to press the latches on both sides to release the server from the rack



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### 4.2 Jumpers

### 1. Clear RTC RAM (CLRTC1)

This jumper allows you to clear the Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM in CMOS. You can clear the CMOS memory of date, time, and system setup parameters by erasing the CMOS RTC RAM data. The onboard button cell battery powers the RAM data in CMOS, which include system setup information such as system passwords.

### To erase the BTC BAM:


- 1. Turn OFF the computer and unplug the power cord.
- 2. Move the jumper cap from pins 1–2 (default) to pins 2–3. Keep the cap on pins 2–3 for about 5–10 seconds, then move the cap back to pins 1–2.
- 3. Plug the power cord and turn ON the computer.
- Hold down the <Del> key during the boot process and enter BIOS setup to re-enter data



Except when clearing the RTC RAM, never remove the cap on CLRTC jumper default position. Removing the cap will cause system boot failure!




If the steps above do not help, remove the onboard battery and move the jumper again to clear the CMOS RTC RAM data. After the CMOS clearance, reinstall the battery.



### 2. VGA controller setting (3-pin VGA\_SW1)


This jumper allows you to enable or disable the onboard VGA controller. Set to pins 1–2 to activate the VGA feature.

### 3. LAN controller setting (3-pin LAN\_SW1, LAN\_SW2)


These jumpers allow you to enable or disable the onboard Intel® WG82574L Gigabit LAN1/2 controller. Set to pins 1–2 to activate the Gigabit LAN feature.



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### 4. iBTN RAID setting (3-pin IBTN\_SEL1)

This jumper allows you to select the RAID configuration utility to use when you create disk arrays. Place the jumper caps on pins 1–2 if you install a PIKE RAID card to the motherboard and want to use the LSI Logic MPT Setup Utility (default). Or you can place the jumper caps on pins 2–3 to create the LSI Mega RAID 5 by supported Intel® ICH10R SATA controller.



- LSI Logic MPT Setup Utility is available only when you install a PIKE RAID card.
- LSI Mega RAID 5 fucntion is available only when you place the iBTN to I\_BTN1 slot and install an optional ASUS PIKE RAID card.

### 5. RAID configuration utility selection (3-pin RAID\_SEL1)

This jumper allows you to select the RAID configuration utility to use when you create disk arrays. Place the jumper caps over pins 1–2 if you want to use the LSI Logic Embedded SATA RAID Setup Utility (default); otherwise, place the jumper caps to pins 2–3 to use the Intel<sup>®</sup> Matrix Storage Manager.




### 6. Force BIOS recovery setting (3-pin RECOVERY1)

This jumper allows you to quickly update or recover the BIOS settings when it becomes corrupted.

### To update the BIOS:

- Prepare a USB flash disk that contains the original or latest BIOS for the motherboard (XXXXXX.ROM) and the AFUDOS.EXE utility.
- 2. Set the jumper to pins 2-3.
- 3. Insert the USB flash disk then turn on the system to update the BIOS.
- 4. Shut down the system.
- 5. Set the jumper back to pins 1-2.
- 6. Turn on the system.





### 7. IPMI setting (3-pin IPMI\_SEL1)


This jumper allows you to use the IPMI feature through the dedicated LAN or share LAN. Place the jumper caps on pins 1–2 if you want to use IPMI through the dedicated LAN (default). Or you can place the jumper caps on pins 2–3 to use IPMI through the shared LAN.



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### 8. Fan control setting (3-pin FAN\_SEL1)

This jumper allows you to switch for fan pin selection. Set to pins 1–2 when using 4-pin fans or pins 2–3 when using 3-pin fans.






- If you use a 4-pin fan but set the jumper to pin 2-3, the fan you installed may not work.
- If you use a 3-pin fan but set the jumper for a 4-pin fan, the fan controll will not work and the fan you installed will always run at full speed.

### 9. DDR3 voltage setting (4-pin LVDDR3\_SEL1/2)


These jumpers allow you to select DDR3 DIMM voltage settings. Place the jumper caps on pins 1–2 if you want to control DDR3 voltage by BIOS settings (default). Place the jumper caps on pins 2–3 to force the DDR3 DIMMs to run at +1.2V. Or you can place the jumper caps on pins 3–4 to force the DDR3 DIMMs to run at +1.35V.



### 4.3 Internal connectors


### 1. Serial ATA connectors (7-pin SATA1-4 [red], SATA5-6 [black])

These connectors, controlled by southbridge ICH10R, are for the Serial ATA signal cables for Serial ATA hard disk drives.



### 2. SAS connectors (7-pin SAS1-4 [red]; 7-pin SAS5-8 [blue])

This motherboard comes with eight (8) Serial Attached SCSI (SAS) connectors, the next-generation technology that supports both Serial Attached SCSI (SAS) and Serial ATA (SATA). Each connector supports one device.






- These connectors function only when you install a PIKE RAID card.
- Connect the SAS hard disk drives to SAS connectors 1–4 (red) when installing a 4-port PIKE RAID card.

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### 3. Hard disk activity LED connector (4-pin HDLED1)


This connector is used to connect to a hard disk drive active LED connector on the SCSI or RAID card.



Z8NR-D12-SYS Storage card activity LED connector


### 4. Serial General Purpose Input/Output connector (6-1 pin SGPIO1)

This connector is used for the SGPIO peripherals for the LSI embedded SATA RAID or Intel Matrix RAID.



### 5. Serial General Purpose Input/Output connectors (6-1 pin SGPIO2/3)

These connector is used for the SAS chip SIO interface that controls the LED pattern generation, device information and general purpose data.






These connectors functions only when you install a PIKE SAS RAID card.

### 6. USB connectors (10-1 pin USB34, USB56; 4-pin USB7)

The USB34 and USB56 connectors are for USB 2.0 ports. Connect the USB module cable to the connectors, and then install the module to a slot opening at the back of the system chassis. The USB7 connector is for a A-type internal USB 2.0 device. The USB connectors comply with USB 2.0 specification that supports up to 480 Mbps connection speed.



### CPU and system fan connectors (4-pin CPU FAN1/2, REAR FAN1/2, FRNT FAN1/2/3/4)

The fan connectors support cooling fans of 350 mA–740 mA (8.88 W max.) or a total of 3.15 A–6.66 A (53.28 W max.) at +12V. Connect the fan cables to the fan connectors on the motherboard, making sure that the black wire of each cable matches the ground pin of the connector.




DO NOT forget to connect the fan cables to the fan connectors. Insufficient air flow inside the system may damage the motherboard components. These are not jumpers! DO NOT place jumper caps on the fan connectors!



### 8. Serial port connector (10-1 pin COM2)

This connector is for a serial (COM) port. Connect the serial port module cable to this connector, then install the module to a slot opening at the back of the system chassis.




Z8NR-D12-SYS Serial port connector

### 9. Power supply SMBus connector (5-pin PSUSMB1)


This connector is for the power supply SMB cable, if your power supply supports the SMBus function.

### 10. Baseboard Management Controller (BMC) connector (14-pin BMC\_FW1)

This is an interface used to plug in an ASMB4-SOL or ASMB4-iKVM management device.






The ASMB4 management device is purchased separately.

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### 11. SSI power connectors (24-pin ATXPWR1, 8-pin ATX12V1/2)

These connectors are for SSI power supply plugs. The power supply plugs are designed to fit these connectors in only one orientation. Find the proper orientation and push down firmly until the connectors completely fit.






- For a fully configured system, we recommend that you use an SSI 12 V-compliant power supply unit (PSU) for LGA1366-socket Intel® Xeon processors.
- DO NOT forget to connect the 24+8+8-pin power plugs; otherwise, the system will not boot up.
- Use of a PSU with a higher power output is recommended when configuring a system with more power consuming devices. The system may become unstable or may not boot up if the power is inadequate.
- You must install a PSU with a higher power rating if you intend to install additional devices

### 12. System panel connector (20-pin PANEL1 [white])

This connector supports several chassis-mounted functions.

### 1. System power LED (3-pin PLED)

This 3-pin connector is for the system power LED. Connect the chassis power LED cable to this connector. The system power LED lights up when you turn on the system power, and blinks when the system is in sleep mode.

### 2. Message LED (2-pin MLED)

This 2-pin connector is for the message LED cable that connects to the front message LED. The message LED is controlled by Hardware monitor to indicate an abnormal event occurance

### 3. System warning speaker (4-pin SPEAKER)

This 4-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted system warning speaker. The speaker allows you to hear system beeps and warnings.

### 4. Hard disk drive activity LED (2-pin IDE\_LED)

This 2-pin connector is for the HDD Activity LED. Connect the HDD Activity LED cable to this connector. The IDE LED lights up or flashes when data is read from or written to the HDD.

### 5. ATX power button/soft-off button (2-pin PWRSW)

This connector is for the system power button. Pressing the power button turns the system on or puts the system in sleep or soft-off mode depending on the BIOS settings. Pressing the power switch for more than four seconds while the system is ON turns the system OFF.


### 6. Reset button (2-pin RESET)

This 2-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted reset button for system reboot without turning off the system power.

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### 13. Auxiliary panel connector (20-pin AUX PANEL1 [black])

This connector is for additional front panel features including front panel SMB. locator LED and switch, chassis intrusion, and LAN LEDs.

1. Front panel SMB (6-1 pin FPSMB)

These leads connect the front panel SMBus cable.

- 2. LAN activity LED (2-pin LAN1 LED, LAN2 LED) These leads are for Gigabit LAN activity LEDs on the front panel.
- Chassis intrusion (4-1 pin CHASSIS) 3.

These leads are for the intrusion detection feature for chassis with intrusion sensor or microswitch. When you remove any chassis component, the sensor triggers and sends a high-level signal to these leads to record a chassis intrusion event. The default setting is short CASEOPEN and GND pin by jumper cap to disable the function.

- Locator LED (2-pin LOCATORLED1 and 2-pin LOCATORLED2) These leads are for the locator LED1 and LED2 on the front panel. Connect the Locator LED cables to these 2-pin connector. The LEDs will light up when the Locator button is pressed.
- Locator Button/Swich (2-pin LOCATORBTN)

These leads are for the locator button on the front panel. This button queries the state of the system locator.

### Chapter 5

This chapter tells how to change the system settings through the BIOS Setup menus. Detailed descriptions of the BIOS parameters are also provided.

### BIOS setup

### 5.1 Managing and updating your BIOS

The following utilities allow you to manage and update the motherboard Basic Input/Output System (BIOS) setup:

- AFUDOS utility (Updates the BIOS in DOS mode using a bootable USB flash drive.)
- ASUS CrashFree BIOS 3 (To recover the BIOS using a USB flash drive when the BIOS file fails or gets corrupted.)

Refer to the corresponding sections for details on these utilities.



Save a copy of the original motherboard BIOS file to a bootable USB flash drive in case you need to restore the BIOS in the future. Copy the original motherboard BIOS using the AFUDOS utility.

### 5.1.1 AFUDOS utility

The AFUDOS utility allows you to update the BIOS file in DOS environment using a bootable USB flash drive with the updated BIOS file. This utility also allows you to copy the current BIOS file that you can use as backup when the BIOS fails or gets corrupted during the updating process.

### Copying the current BIOS

To copy the current BIOS file using the AFUDOS utility:



- Ensure that the USB flash drive is not write-protected and has at least 2048 KB free space to save the file.
- The succeeding BIOS screens are for reference only. The actual BIOS screen displays may not be the same as shown.
- Copy the AFUDOS utility (afudos.exe) from the motherboard support CD to the bootable USB flash drive.
- 2. Boot the system in DOS mode, and then at the prompt type:

### afudos /o[filename]

where the [filename] is any user-assigned filename not more than eight alphanumeric characters for the main filename and three alphanumeric characters for the extension name.

3. Press <Enter>. The utility copies the current BIOS file to the USB flash drive.

### Updating the BIOS file

To update the BIOS file using the AFUDOS utility:

 Visit the ASUS website (www.asus.com) and download the latest BIOS file for the motherboard. Save the BIOS file to a bootable USB flash drive.



Write the BIOS filename on a piece of paper. You need to type the exact BIOS filename at the DOS prompt.

- Copy the AFUDOS utility (afudos.exe) from the motherboard support CD to the bootable USB flash drive.
- 3. Boot the system in DOS mode, and then at the prompt type:

afudos /i[filename]
```

where [filename] is the latest or the original BIOS file on the bootable USB flash drive. and then press <Enter>.

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### 5.1.2 ASUS CrashFree BIOS 3 utility

The ASUS CrashFree BIOS 3 is an auto recovery tool that allows you to restore the BIOS file when it fails or gets corrupted during the updating process. You can update a corrupted BIOS file using a USB flash drive that contains the updated BIOS file.



Prepare a USB flash drive containing the updated motherboard BIOS before using this utility.

To recover the BIOS using ASUS CrashFree BIOS 3

- 1. Insert the USB flash disk that contains the BIOS file to the USB port.
- 2. Turn on the system.
- 3. The utility will automatically checks the devices for the BIOS file. When found, the utility reads the BIOS file and starts flashing the corrupted BIOS file.
- 4. Restart the system after the utility completes the updating process.



DO NOT shut down or reset the system while recovering the BIOS! Doing so would cause system boot failure!



The recovered BIOS may not be the latest BIOS version for this motherboard. Visit the ASUS website (www.asus.com) to download the latest BIOS file.

### 5.2 BIOS setup program

This motherboard supports a programmable firmware chip that you can update using the provided utility described in section **5.1 Managing and updating your BIOS**.

Use the BIOS Setup program when you are installing a motherboard, reconfiguring your system, or prompted to "Run Setup." This section explains how to configure your system using this utility.

Even if you are not prompted to use the Setup program, you can change the configuration of your computer in the future. For example, you can enable the security password feature or change the power management settings. This requires you to reconfigure your system using the BIOS Setup program so that the computer can recognize these changes and record them in the CMOS RAM of the firmware chip.

The firmware chip on the motherboard stores the Setup utility. When you start up the computer, the system provides you with the opportunity to run this program. Press <Del> during the Power-On Self-Test (POST) to enter the Setup utility; otherwise, POST continues with its test routines.

If you wish to enter Setup after POST, restart the system by pressing <Ctrl+Alt+Delete>, or by pressing the reset button on the system chassis. You can also restart by turning the system off and then back on. Do this last option only if the first two failed


The Setup program is designed to make it as easy to use as possible. Being a menu-driven program, it lets you scroll through the various sub-menus and make your selections from the available options using the navigation keys.

To select an item on the menu bar, press the right or left arrow key on the keyboard until the desired item is highlighted.

### 5.2.3 Navigation keys

At the bottom right corner of a menu screen are the navigation keys for that particular menu. Use the navigation keys to select items in the menu and change the settings.



Some of the navigation keys differ from one screen to another.

### 5.2.4 Menu items

The highlighted item on the menu bar displays the specific items for that menu. For example, selecting Main shows the Main menu items.

The other items (Advanced, Power, Boot, and Exit) on the menu bar have their respective menu items.

### 5.2.5 Sub-menu items

A solid triangle before each item on any menu screen means that the item has a sub-menu. To display the sub-menu, select the item and press <Enter>.

### 5.2.6 Configuration fields

These fields show the values for the menu items. If an item is user-configurable, you can change the value of the field opposite the item. You cannot select an item that is not user-configurable.

A configurable field is enclosed in brackets, and is highlighted when selected. To change the value of a field, select it then press <Enter> to display a list of options. Refer to **5.2.7 Pop-up window**.

### 5.2.7 Pop-up window

Select a menu item then press <Enter>
to display a pop-up window with the configuration options for that item.

### 5.2.8 Scroll bar

A scroll bar appears on the right side of a menu screen when there are items that do not fit on the screen. Press the Up/ Down arrow keys or <Page Up> /<Page Down> keys to display the other items on the screen.

At the top right corner of the menu screen is a brief description of the selected item.



#### Quick Boot [Enabled]

Enabling this item allows the BIOS to skip some power on self tests (POST) while booting to decrease the time needed to boot the system. When set to [Disabled], BIOS performs all the POST items. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

#### Full Screen Logo [Enabled]

Allows you to enable or disable the full screen logo display feature. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]



Set this item to [Enabled] to use the ASUS MyLogo2™ feature.

# AddOn ROM Display Mode [Force BIOS]

Allows you to set the display mode for Options ROM. Configuration options: [Force BIOS] [Keep Current]

# Bootup Num-Lock [On]

Allows you to select the power-on state for the NumLock. Configuration options: [Off] [On]

# Wait For 'F1' If Error [Enabled]

When set to [Enabled], the system waits for the <F1> key to be pressed when error occurs. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

# Hit 'DEL' Message Display [Enabled]


When set to [Enabled], the system displays the message "Press DEL to run Setup" during POST. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

# Interrupt 19 Capture [Enabled]

When set to [Enabled], this function allows the option ROMs to trap Interrupt 19. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

# 5.6.3 Security

The Security menu items allow you to change the system security settings. Select an item then press <Enter> to display the configuration options.



#### **Change Supervisor Password**

Select this item to set or change the supervisor password. The **Supervisor Password** item on top of the screen shows the default **Not Installed**. After you set a password, this item shows **Installed**.

To set a Supervisor Password:

- Select the Change Supervisor Password item and press < Enter>.
- 2. From the password box, type a password composed of at least six letters and/or numbers, then press <Enter>.
- 3. Confirm the password when prompted.

The message "Password Installed" appears after you successfully set your password.

To change the supervisor password, follow the same steps as in setting a user password.

To clear the supervisor password, select the **Change Supervisor Password** then press <Enter>. The message "Password Uninstalled" appears.



If you forget your BIOS password, you can clear it by erasing the CMOS Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM. See section **4.2 Jumpers** for information on how to erase the RTC RAM

After you have set a supervisor password, the other items appear to allow you to change other security settings.



#### **User Access Level [Full Access]**

This item allows you to select the access restriction to the Setup items. Configuration options: [No Access] [View Only] [Limited] [Full Access]

No Access prevents user access to the Setup utility.

View Only allows access but does not allow change to any field.

**Limited** allows changes only to selected fields, such as Date and Time.

**Full Access** allows viewing and changing all the fields in the Setup utility.

#### **Change User Password**

Select this item to set or change the user password. The **User Password** item on top of the screen shows the default **Not Installed**. After you set a password, this item shows Installed.

To set a User Password:

- 1. Select the **Change User Password** item and press <Enter>.
- On the password box that appears, type a password composed of at least six letters and/or numbers, then press <Enter>.
- Confirm the password when prompted.

The message "Password Installed" appears after you set your password successfully.

To change the user password, follow the same steps as in setting a user password.

# Password Check [Setup]

When set to [Setup], BIOS checks for user password when accessing the Setup utility. When set to [Always], BIOS checks for user password both when accessing Setup and booting the system. Configuration options: [Setup] [Always]

# 5.7 Exit menu

The Exit menu items allow you to load the optimal or failsafe default values for the BIOS items, and save or discard your changes to the BIOS items.





Pressing <Esc> does not immediately exit this menu. Select one of the options from this menu or <F10> from the legend bar to exit.

#### **Exit & Save Changes**

Once you are finished making your selections, choose this option from the Exit menu to ensure the values you selected are saved to the CMOS RAM. An onboard backup battery sustains the CMOS RAM so it stays on even when the PC is turned off. When you select this option, a confirmation window appears. Select **YES** to save changes and exit.



If you attempt to exit the Setup program without saving your changes, the program prompts you with a message asking if you want to save your changes before exiting. Press <Enter> to save the changes while exiting.

# **Exit & Discard Changes**

Select this option only if you do not want to save the changes that you made to the Setup program. If you made changes to fields other than System Date, System Time, and Password, the BIOS asks for a confirmation before exiting.

# **Discard Changes**

This option allows you to discard the selections you made and restore the previously saved values. After selecting this option, a confirmation appears. Select **YES** to discard any changes and load the previously saved values.

# **Load Setup Defaults**

This option allows you to load the default values for each of the parameters on the Setup menus. When you select this option or if you press <F5>, a confirmation window appears. Select **YES** to load default values. Select **Exit & Save Changes** or make other changes before saving the values to the non-volatile RAM.

# Chapter 6

This chapter provides instructions for setting up, creating and configuring RAID sets using the available utilities.

# RAID

# 6.1 Setting up RAID

The motherboard comes with the Intel® ICH10R southbridge controller that supports the following SATA RAID solutions:

- LSI Software RAID Configuration Utility (default) with RAID 0, RAID 1, and RAID 10 support (for both Linux and Windows OS).
- Intel Matrix Storage Manager with RAID 0, RAID 1, RAID 10, and RAID 5 support (for Windows OS only).

#### 6.1.1 RAID definitions

**RAID 0** (*Data striping*) optimizes two identical hard disk drives to read and write data in parallel, interleaved stacks. Two hard disks perform the same work as a single drive but at a sustained data transfer rate, double that of a single disk alone, thus improving data access and storage. Use of two new identical hard disk drives is required for this setup.

**RAID 1** (*Data mirroring*) copies and maintains an identical image of data from one drive to a second drive. If one drive fails, the disk array management software directs all applications to the surviving drive as it contains a complete copy of the data in the other drive. This RAID configuration provides data protection and increases fault tolerance to the entire system. Use two new drives or use an existing drive and a new drive for this setup. The new drive must be of the same size or larger than the existing drive.

**RAID 10** is data striping and data mirroring combined without parity (redundancy data) having to be calculated and written. With the RAID 10 configuration you get all the benefits of both RAID 0 and RAID 1 configurations. Use four new hard disk drives or use an existing drive and three new drives for this setup.

**RAID 5** stripes both data and parity information across three or more hard disk drives. Among the advantages of RAID 5 configuration include better HDD performance, fault tolerance, and higher storage capacity. The RAID 5 configuration is best suited for transaction processing, relational database applications, enterprise resource planning, and other business systems. Use a minimum of three identical hard disk drives for this setup.

# 6.1.2 Installing hard disk drives

The motherboard supports SATA hard disk drives for RAID set configuration. For optimal performance, install identical drives of the same model and capacity when creating a disk array.

#### 6.1.3 RAID controller selection

You can choose either the LSI Software RAID Configuration Utility or the Intel Matrix Storage Manager as the default utility to create RAID set(s). See **5. RAID configuration utility selection** on page 4-6 for details.

# 6.1.4 Setting the RAID item in BIOS

You must enable the RAID function in the BIOS Setup before creating RAID set(s) using SATA HDDs. To do this:

- 1. Enter the BIOS Setup during POST.
- 2. Go to the **Main** menu > **IDE Configuration**, and then press <Enter>.
- 3. Set the Configure SATA as item to [RAID].
- 4. Save your changes, and then exit the BIOS Setup.



Refer to Chapter 5 for details on entering and navigating through the BIOS Setup.

# **6.2 LSI Software RAID Configuration Utility**

The LSI MegaRAID software RAID configuration utility allows you to create RAID 0, RAID 1, or RAID 10 set(s) from SATA hard disk drives connected to the SATA connectors supported by the motherboard southbridge chip.

To enter the LSI MegaRAID software RAID configuration utility

- 1. Turn on the system after installing all the SATA hard disk drives.
- During POST, the LSI MegaRAID software RAID configuration utility automatically detects the installed SATA hard disk drives and displays any existing RAID set(s). Press <Ctrl> + <M> to enter the utility.

- The LSI MegaRAID software RAID configuration utility automatically configures to RAID 1 when the SATA to RAID Mode is enabled.
- The RAID setup screens shown in this section are for reference only and may not exactly match the items on your screen due to the controller version difference.
- When you create RAID sets with the LSI MegaRAID software RAID configuration utility, the boot priority of the SATA optical drive has to be manually adjusted. Otherwise, the system will not boot from the connected SATA ODD.
- The utility main window appears. Use the arrow keys to select an option from the Management Menu and then press <Enter>. Refer to the Management Menu descriptions on the next page.

At the bottom of the screen is the legend box. The keys on the legend box allow you to navigate through the setup menu options or execute commands. The keys on the legend box vary according to the menu level.

# 6.2.1 Creating a RAID set

The LSI Software RAID Configuration Utility allows you to create a RAID 0, RAID 1, or RAID 10 set using two types of configurations: **Easy** and **New**.


In **Easy Configuration**, the virtual drive parameters are set automatically.

In New Configuration, you manually set the virtual drive parameters.

#### **Using Easy Configuration**

To create a RAID set using the Easy Configuration option

 From the Management Menu, select Configure > Easy Configuration, and then press <Enter>.




 The ARRAY SELECTION MENU displays the available drives connected to the SATA ports. Use the up/down arrow key to select the drives you want to include in the RAID set, and then press <Space>. When selected, the drive indicator changes from READY to ONLIN A[X]-[Y], where X is the array number, and Y is the drive number.







- The information of the selected hard disk drive displays at the bottom of the screen.
- · You need at least two identical hard disk drives when creating a RAID 1 set.
- You need at least four identical hard disk drives when creating a RAID 10 set
- Select all the drives required for the RAID set, and then press <F10> to configure array setting.
- 4. Press <Space> to select the configurable array.




 Press <F10> again, the virtual drive information appears including a Virtual Drive menu that allows you to change the virtual drive parameters.






Enabling DWC can improve the performance, but with the risk of data loss.

10. When finished setting the selected virtual drive configuration, select **Accept** from the menu, and then press <Enter>.



- 11. Follow step 2 to 10 to configure additional virtual drives.
- Press <Esc> to finish RAID configuration. When prompted to save configuration, select Yes from the menu, and then press <Enter>.




#### **Using New Configuration**




When a RAID set already exists, using the **New Configuration** command erases the existing RAID configuration data. If you do not want to delete the existing RAID set, use the **View/Add Configuration** command to view or create another RAID configuration.

To create a RAID set using the **New Configuration** option

 From the Management Menu, select Configure > New Configuration, and then press <Enter>.



- 2. Follow step 2 to 7 of the previous section: **Using Easy Configuration**.
- 3. Select **Size** from the **Virtual Drive** menu, and then press <Enter>.




# 6.2.3 Initializing the virtual drives

After creating the RAID set(s), you must initialize the virtual drives. You may initialize the virtual drives of a RAID set(s) using the **Initialize** or **Objects** command on the **Management Menu**.

#### Using the Initialize command

To initialize the virtual drive using the Initialize command

1. From the Management Menu, select Initialize, and then press <Enter>.



 The screen displays the available RAID set(s) and prompts you to select the virtual drive to initialize. Use the arrow keys to select the virtual drive from the Virtual Drive selection, and then press <Space>.




3. Press <F10> to start initialization. When prompted, select **Yes** from the **Initialize?** dialog box, and then press <Enter>.





Initializing a virtual drive erases all data on the drive.

4. A progress bar appears on screen. If desired, press <Esc> to abort initialization. When initialization is completed, press <Esc>.



#### **Using the Objects command**

To initialize the virtual drives using the Objects command



# 6.2.4 Rebuilding failed drives


You can manually rebuild failed hard disk drives using the **Rebuild** command in the **Management Menu**.

To rebuild a failed hard disk drive

1. From the Management Menu, select Rebuild, and then press <Enter>.



 The PHYSICAL DRIVES SELECTION MENU displays the available drives connected to the SATA ports. Select the drive you want to rebuild, and then press <Space>.



After selecting the drive to rebuild, press <F10>. When prompted, press <Y>
to rebuild the drive.



4. When rebuild is complete, press any key to continue.

#### 6.2.5 Checking the drives for data consistency

You can check and verify the accuracy of data redundancy in the selected virtual drive. The utility can automatically detect and/or detect and correct any differences in data redundancy depending on the selected option in the **Objects > Adapter** menu.



The **Check Consistency** command is available only for virtual drives included in a RAID 1 or RAID 10 set.





- While checking the disk consistency, press <Esc> to display the following options.
  - Stop

     Stops the consistency check. The utility stores the percentage of disk checked, and when you restart checking, it continues from the last percentage completed rather than from zero percent.
  - Continue Continues the consistency check.
  - Abort Aborts the consistency check. When you restart checking, it continues from zero percent.
- 5. When checking is complete, press any key to continue.







 From the Management Menu, select Configure > Select Boot Drive, and then press <Enter>.



2. When prompted, use the arrow keys to select the bootable virtual drive from the list, then press <Enter>.



3. The virtual drive is selected as boot drive. Press any key to continue.

#### 6.2.8 Enabling WriteCache

You may manually enable the RAID controller's WriteCache option after creating a RAID set to improve the data transmission performance.




When you enable WriteCache, you may lose data when a power interruption occurs while transmitting or exchanging data among the drives.



The WriteCache function is recommended for RAID 1 and RAID 10 sets.

#### To enable WriteCache

- 1. From the **Management Menu**, select **Objects > Adapter**, and then press <Enter> to display the adapter properties.
- 2. Select **Disk WC**, and then press <Enter> to turn on the option.





# **6.3** Intel® Matrix Storage Manager Option ROM Utility

The Intel® Matrix Storage Manager Option ROM utility allows you to create RAID 0, RAID 1, RAID 10 (RAID 0+1), and RAID 5 set(s) from Serial ATA hard disk drives that are connected to the Serial ATA connectors supported by the Southbridge.

To enter the Intel® Matrix Storage Manager option ROM utility:

- 1. Install all the Serial ATA hard disk drives.
- 2. Turn on the system.
- 3. During POST, press <Ctrl+l> to display the utility main menu.



The navigation keys at the bottom of the screen allow you to move through the menus and select the menu options.



The RAID BIOS setup screens shown in this section are for reference only and may not exactly match the items on your screen.



The utility supports maximum four hard disk drives for RAID configuration.

#### 6.3.1 Creating a RAID set

To create a BAID set

 From the utility main menu, select 1. Create RAID Volume and press <Enter>. The following screen appears.



- 2. Enter a name for the RAID set and press <Enter>.
- When the RAID Level item is selected, press the up/down arrow key to select a RAID level to create, and then press <Enter>.
- When the **Disks** item is selected, press <Enter> to select the hard disk drives you want to include in the RAID set. The **SELECT DISKS** screen appears.



Use the up/down arrow key to select a drive, and then press <Space>
to select. A small triangle marks the selected drive. Press <Enter> after
completing your selection.

6. Use the up/down arrow key to select the stripe size for the RAID array (for RAID 0, 10 and 5 only), and then press <Enter>. The available stripe size values range from 4 KB to 128 KB. The following are typical values:

RAID 0: 128KB RAID 10: 64KB RAID 5: 64KB



We recommend a lower stripe size for server systems, and a higher stripe size for multimedia computer systems used mainly for audio and video editing.

- When the Capacity item is selected, enter the RAID volume capacity that you
  want and press <Enter>. The default value indicates the maximum allowed
  capacity.
- When the Create Volume item is selected, press <Enter>. The following warning message appears.

- 2. Enter a name for the recovery set and press <Enter>.
- 3. When the **RAID Level** item is selected, press the up/down arrow key to select **Recovery**, and then press <Enter>.
- When the **Disks** item is selected, press <Enter> to select the hard disk drives you want to include in the recovery set. The **SELECT DISKS** screen appears.



- Use the up/down arrow key to select a drive, press <TAB> to select a Master disk, and then press <SPACE> to select a Recovery disk. A small triangle marks the selected drive. Press <Enter> after completing your selection.
- When the **Sync** item is selected, use the up/down arrow key to select a sync option that you want and press <Enter>.
- When the Create Volume item is selected, press <Enter>. The following warning message appears.


#### 6.3.3 Deleting a RAID set



Take caution when deleting a RAID set. You will lose all data on the hard disk drives when you delete a RAID set.

#### To delete a RAID set

1. From the utility main menu, select **2. Delete RAID Volume** and press <Enter>. The following screen appears.



2. Use the up/down arrow key to select the RAID set you want to delete, and then press <Del>. The following warning message appears.

# 6.3.4 Resetting disks to Non-RAID



Take caution before you reset a RAID volume hard disk drive to non-RAID. Resetting a RAID volume hard disk drive deletes all internal RAID structure on the drive.

#### To reset a RAID set hard disk drive

 From the utility main menu, select 3. Reset Disks to Non-RAID and press <Enter>. The following screen appears.



- Use the up/down arrow key to select the RAID set drive(s) you want to reset, and then press <Space> to select.
- Press <Enter> to reset the RAID set drive(s). A confirmation message appears.
- Press <Y> to reset the drive(s) or press <N> to return to the utility main menu.

## 6.3.5 Recovery Volume Options

If you have created a recovery set, you can configure more recovery set options following the descriptions in the section.



See section **6.3.2 Creating a Recovery set** to create a recovery set before continue

To configure a recovery set

1. From the utility main menu, select **4. Recovery Volume Options** and press <Enter>. The following screen appears.

#### 6.3.7 Rebuilding the RAID



This option is only for the RAID 1, RAID 5 and RAID 10 sets.

#### Rebuilding the RAID with other non-RAID disk

If any of the SATA hard disk drives included in the RAID 1 array failed, the system displays the status of the RAID volume as "**Degraded**" during POST. You can rebuild the RAID array with other installed non-RAID disks.

To rebuild the RAID with other non-RAID disk:

- At the prompt, press <Ctrl> + <I> to enter the Intel Matrix Storage Manager option ROM utility.
- If there is a non-RAID SATA Hard Disk available, the utility will prompt to rebuild the RAID. Press <Enter>, and then use up/down arrow keys to select the destination disk or press <ESC> to exit.



Select a destination disk with the same size as the original hard disk.

The utility immediately starts rebuilding after the disk is selected. The status of the degraded RAID volume is changed to "Rebuild".

- 4. Exit Intel Matrix Storage Manager and reboot the system.
- Select Start > Programs > Intel Matrix Storage > Intel Matrix Storage
   Console or click the Intel Matrix Storage Manager tray icon to load the Intel Matrix Stroage Manager utility.
- From the View menu, select Advanced Mode to display the details of the Intel Matrix Storage Console.
- From the Volumes view option, select RAID volume to view the rebuilding status. When finished, the status is changed to "Normal".

#### Rebuilding the RAID with a new hard disk

If any of the SATA hard disk drives included in the RAID array failed, the system displays the status of the RAID volume as "**Degraded**" during POST. You may replace the disk drive and rebuild the RAID array.

To rebuild the RAID with a new hard disk:

 Remove the failed SATA hard disk and install a new SATA hard disk of the same specification into the same SATA Port.



Select a destination disk with the same size as the original hard disk.

Reboot the system and then follow the steps in section Rebuilding the RAID with other non-RAID disk on page 6-31.

# 6.3.8 Setting the Boot array in the BIOS Setup Utility

You can set the boot priority sequence in the BIOS for your RAID arrays when creating multi-RAID using the Intel® Matrix Storage Manager.

To set the boot array in the BIOS:



Set at least one of the arrays bootable to boot from the hard disk.

- Reboot the system and press <Del> to enter the BIOS setup utility during POST.
- 2. Go to the **Boot** menu and select the option **Boot Device Priority**.
- Use up/down arrow keys to select the boot priority and press <Enter>. See section 5.6.1 Boot Device Priority for details.
- 4. From the **Exit** menu, select **Exit & Save Changes**, then press <Enter>.
- 5. When the confirmation window appears, select **OK**, then press <Enter>.

# **Chapter 7**

This chapter provides instructions for installing the necessary drivers for different system components.

# installation Driver

# 7.1 RAID driver installation

After creating the RAID sets for your server system, you are now ready to install an operating system to the independent hard disk drive or bootable array. This part provides instructions on how to install the RAID controller drivers during OS installation.

## 7.1.1 Creating a RAID driver disk



You may have to use another system to create the RAID driver disk from the system/motherboard support DVD or from the Internet.




If you have created RAID sets with the LSI Software RAID configuration utility, the boot priority of the SATA optical disk drive has to be manually adjusted. Otherwise, the system will not boot from the connected SATA ODD.

A floppy disk with the RAID driver is required when installing Windows® or Red Hat® Enterprise operating system on a hard disk drive that is included in a RAID set. You can create a RAID driver disk in DOS (using the Makedisk application in the support DVD).

To create a RAID driver disk in DOS environment

- 1. Place the motherboard support DVD in the optical drive.
- 2. Restart the computer, and then enter the BIOS Setup.
- Select the optical drive as the first boot priority to boot from the support DVD. Save your changes, and then exit the BIOS Setup.
- 4. Restart the computer. The Makedisk menu appears.



 Use the arrow keys to select the type of RAID driver disk you want to create and press <Enter> to enter the sub-menu.

- Locate the RAID driver and place a blank, high-density floppy disk to the floppy disk drive.
- 7. Press <Enter>.
- 8. Follow screen instructions to create the driver disk.

To create a RAID driver disk in Windows® environment

- Start Windows<sup>®</sup>.
- 2. Place the motherboard support DVD into the optical drive.
- Go to the Make Disk menu, and then select the type of RAID driver disk you want to create.
- 4. Insert a floppy disk into the floppy disk drive.
- 5. Follow succeeding screen instructions to complete the process.



Write-protect the floppy disk to avoid computer virus infection.

To create a RAID driver disk in Red Hat® Enterprise Linux server environment:

- 1. Insert a blank formatted high-density floppy disk to the floppy disk drive.
- Decompress the file into the floppy disk from the following path in the support DVD:



To install the RAID controller driver when installing Windows® Server OS:


1. Boot the computer using the Windows® Server installation DVD. The Windows® Server OS Setup starts.



- 2. Press <F6> when the message "Press F6 if you need to install a third party SCSI or RAID driver..." appears at the bottom of the screen.
- 3. When prompted, press <S> to specify an additional device.



4. Insert the RAID driver disk you created earlier to the floppy disk drive, then press <Enter>.



- 5. Select the RAID controller driver you need from the list, then press <Enter>.
- 6. The Windows® Setup loads the RAID controller drivers from the RAID driver disk. When prompted, press <Enter> to continue installation.
- Setup then proceeds with the OS installation. Follow screen instructions to continue.



- Windows<sup>®</sup> automatically detects the RAID controller and displays a New Hardware Found window. Click Cancel.
- 3. Right-click the **My Computer** icon on the Windows<sup>®</sup> desktop, and then select **Properties** from the menu.
- Click the Hardware tab, and then click the Device Manager button to display the list of devices installed in the system.
- 5. Right-click the **RAID controller** item, then select **Properties**.
- 6. Click the **Driver** tab, and then click the **Update Driver** button.
- 7. The Upgrade Device Driver Wizard window appears. Click Next.
- 8. Insert the RAID driver disk you created earlier to the floppy disk drive.
- Select the option Install the software automatically (Recommended), and then click Next.
- The wizard searches the RAID controller drivers. When found, click Next to install the drivers
- 11. Click **Finish** after the driver installation is done.

To verify the RAID controller driver installation:

- 1. Right-click the **My Computer** icon on the Windows® desktop, and then select **Properties** from the menu.
- 2. Click the Hardware tab, and then click the Device Manager button.
- Click the "+" sign before the item SCSI and RAID controllers, and then the Intel(R) ICH8R/ICH9R/ICH10R/DO SATA RAID Controller item should appear.





The screen differs based on the controller.

- Right-click the RAID controller driver item, and then select Properties from the menu.
- Click the **Driver** tab, and then click the **Driver Details** button to display the RAID controller drivers.
- 6. Click **OK** when finished.

- 3. Click the item Intel Chipset Device Software from the menu.



 The Intel(R) Chipset Device Software window appears. Click Next to start installation.



Select Yes to accept the terms of the License Agreement and continue the process.



Read the Readme File Information and press Next to continue the installation.

- 3. Click the Intel Network Connections Software to begin installation.



4. Click Install Drivers and Software option to begin installation.





#### 7.5.2 Drivers menu

The Drivers menu shows the available device drivers if the system detects installed devices. Install the necessary drivers to activate the devices.



The screen display and driver options vary under different operating system versions.



#### 7.5.3 Utilities menu

The Utilities menu displays the software applications and utilities that the motherboard supports. Click an item to install.



#### 7.5.4 Make disk menu

The Make disk menu contains items to create the Intel ICH10R and LSI MegaRAID driver disks.
